Top 10 Tips for Digital Inclusion

Follow established effective practice in supporting your students. Act in accordance with the <u>UKAT</u> <u>Core Values of Personal Tutoring and Academic Advising</u>, follow the competencies articulated in the <u>UKAT Professional Framework for Academic Advising</u> and Personal Tutoring, and make use of resources available to personal tutors through UKAT (<u>https://www.ukat.uk</u>).



ACKNOWLEDGE NAMES AND IDENTITY

Encourage students to display their preferred names and pronouns, and suggest they upload their picture to their profile.

USING VIDEO CAMERAS

Encourage students to have cameras on, recognising that this is not a requirement and the choice is theirs. Explain that we seek to replicate the classroom experience where we can all see each other when we engage.

USE LIVE CAPTIONS

Make video calls more accessible by enabling the live captions feature where the technology allows

ESTABLISH CLEAR MUTUTAL EXPECTATIONS



Collaboratively set netiquette/engagement expectations, including for breakout rooms. Ask students to agree with these.



BE PRESENT Aim to visit breakout rooms during discussion and encourage conversation.



ENCOURAGE PARTICIPATION

Use polls in group tutorials to encourage engagement and interaction. Remember that polls can be anonymous.



ALLOW FOR TECHNICAL ISSUES Be mindful of students' internet connections as they may drop in and out

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For group tutorials, use breakout rooms to give students time to talk and interact in a small group.

ENCOURAGE SMALL GROUP INTERACTION
